Greg Slate wrote ..

> I am writing you in my capacity as the Executive Director of the
> Police Complaint Center (PCC), a National Non-Profit Organization.
> The PCC is advocacy organization dedicated to training police
> organizations on professionalism, racial profiling, customer service
> and we also advocated for police misconduct victims and conduct hidden
> camera investigation on behalf of Dateline, 20/20, 60 Minutes and many
> other new organizations. Our founder is a former police sergeant and
> qualified expert witness for federal courts on use of force and racial
> profiling. Beyond my role as the executive director of the PCC I also
> serve as the director of investigators here. I have been award an
> Emmy and an Edward R. Murrow Award for my hidden camera investigations
> of police misconduct and work as a consultant for police agencies
> across the country. Additionally, I am a homeowner and former resident of Prince George's
County.
>
> The PCC is currently conducting a national investigation concerns
> police officials who drink and drive, both on duty and off. Based on
> tips we received from individuals inside the Prince George's County
> Police Department we conducted an hidden camera investigation on the
> October 19, 2007 "Adult Halloween Party" and the Prince George's
> County Fraternal Order of Police Lodge 89 (FOP 89). During our
> investigation we documented numerous violations of law and police
> policy. For example, officers who were inside the lodge drinking
> during the FOP 89 party left, entered their department issued police
> vehicles and drove away. One officer was so intoxicated that while driving his car he
keyed his police microphone and began shouting "Move!
> Move, bitches! Get out the way!" This was captured by our camaras.
>
> Unfortunately, our investigation was cut short after off duty drunk
> officers inside the lodge, detained me and one of my staff members.
> They questioned us about the equipment we were carrying. After
> releasing us, two heavily intoxicated officer followed us into the
> parking lot, grabbed me, slammed me onto the hood of a car, punched me
> several time, ripped off my shirt and smashed a video recording I was
> using to film them. The officers then fled into the FOP 89 Lodge. I
> immediately reported this to 911. The officer that responded to my
> 911 call arrived in his personal vehicle with a female citizen in his
> passengers seat. Although, I was the victim reporting an assault,
> illegal detention and destruction of property the officer searched me,
> demanded to know who authorized me to be on the property and allowed
> the FOP 89 President to interrogate me about matter unrelated to my

> assault report. When I pointed out to the officer that police official
> inside the lodge had been drinking heavily and were now leaving in
> county owned police could not reach internal affairs, asked that they
> accept my formal complaint and then outlined the complaint. Several
> hours later I was contacted by Officer ---- with internal affairs. He demanded to know if
I was tape recording him and when I informed him I was he refused to speak to me.
> He advised me to come to internal affairs anytime and speak to someone
> there. On November 8, 2007 I went to the Internal Affairs Office and
> brought copies of all of the video that I shot of the incident,
> including hidden camera footage from inside the FOP 89 Lodge. I met
> with Supervisor ---- and told him that I would like to make a formal
> complaint and show him our video. He asked me if I was recording him
> and then threw me out of the station. As I left the police station I
> was followed several miles by Officer ----- in an unmarked police
> vehicle, after I pulled in to a gas station parking lot Officer -----
> pulled off the side of the road, turned around and returned to the
> police station. Officer ---- and I returned arraigned at the police
> station at the same time and I questioned him about following me. He
> told me that he knew I was taping him and ran inside the police
> station. I returned to the police station and asked to speak to a
> supervisor in internal affairs ----- came into the lobby and I asked
> him why Officer ---- had followed me and informed him that I still
> wanted to make a complaint and provide my video. He told me he would
> not take any information from me other than a written statement on a
> police complaint form and then went behind the counter to get me a
> form. When he returned to the lobby he was flanked by at least 6
> other officers, he grabbed my right hand, ripped my cell phone out of
> my hand and slammed it on the counter with such force that the battery
> flew out. He began yelling at me that it was illegal to take his picture or record him in
Maryland. I was terrified and left the station.

>

> I am writing you to inform that your officers are engaging in
> dangerous and risk behavior off-duty. Many of them are drinking and driving impaired.
> Some are drinking and driving their police cruisers impaired. Based
> on my experience, your police department's internal affairs are
> actively intimidating complainants and refusing to accept evidence.
> Our organization has no confidence in the ability of the Prince
> George's Police Department to conduct a fair and impartial
> investigation of their own officers. The appropriate course of action
> would be to appoint a special investigator to conduct any inquiry into
> misconduct I am reporting to you. I am leaving this information with
> you and will proceed with the evidence my organization has collecting according to the
direction of my board of directors.
